






ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE

- Environmental Justice = Environmental Justice is the fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income with respect to the development, implementation, and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations and policies.
 - Fair treatment means that no group of people including a racial, ethnic, or socioeconomic group, should bear a disproportionate share of the negative environmental consequences resulting from industrial, municipal, and commercial operations or the execution of federal, state, local, and tribal programs and policies.



Environmental Racism: "Racial discrimination in environmental policy-making, enforcement of regulations and laws, and targeting of communities of color for toxic waste disposal and citing of polluting industries." Racial discrimination can be intentional or unintentional and is often a manifestation of "institutional racism." This term acknowledges the political reality that created and continues to perpetuate environmental inequity and injustice.






- live in older, poorly maintained apartment buildings;

....and it is all due to historical and systematic (environmental) racism




