



Scopus has stopped adding content from most of the flagged titles, but the analysis highlights how poor-quality science is infiltrating literature.




## Stakeholder dialogues

- To pave way for dissemination and uptake of recommendations (codesign, co-ownership)









- prevalent are predatory journals and conferences?
- do researchers use predatory journals and conferences?
- have they been combatted to-date?
- might they be combatted in future? how can we raise professional awareness?

#### Why....

- do researchers use predatory journals and conferences?
- does predatory publishing continue to grow?
- might a global consensus be needed?




## 1QD BEALTH Landmark survey on predatory academic practices

#### Results from a survey on predatory academic practices

The purpose of the survey was twofold:

- to inform the project so that it can recommend more effective ways to combat predatory practices and protect researchers everywhere, and
- to raise awareness of these practices amongst the global research community.

Over 1800 researchers from diverse disciplines, academic stages, and countries gave their perspective on predatory academic journals and conferences...





## **D ELLIPY** Landmark survey on predatory academic practices

At least 25% of respondents have either published in a predatory journal, participated in a predatory conference, or don't know if they have.






## Preliminary conclusions (work-in-progress)

Predatory journals and conferences are on the rise and are becoming increasingly sophisticated
Publishers, indexing services, librarians and others are spending increasing amounts of time and money trying to tackle predatory practices.
They are <b>permeating many geographies, disciplines and career stages</b> : no-one can afford to be complacent.
(Post) pandemic working practices may further exacerbate predatory practices.
Distinguishing between predatory, poor quality and unethical publishing practices is difficult – a <b>spectrum approach</b> is more appropriate.
Raising awareness and understanding of predatory practices appears to be the most critical intervention needed to prevent researchers falling prey to them

Commercial interests of the publishing industry are perceived to be the most difficult to contend



## **Preliminary conclusions (work-in-progress)**

To eliminate root causes, we need to go further and work together globally to
 revise conditions for recruitment and career progression in academia
 strengthen academic ownership of the future direction of academic publishing
 promote alternative economic models of (open access) publishing
 make transparent peer review the norm – so that sloppy or non-existent peer review is difficult
 reinvigoration of good practice in training, mentoring and supervision

# Government-University-Industry: emerging ideas for action

## Government

- Governments could promote research standards by:
- Recognizing and supporting journals with a proven track record (through their funding programs),
- Promoting and disseminating ethical standards and good practices in scientific research and publishing.

#### University

- Universities could address research evaluation/assessment by:
- Implementing transparent evaluation and assessment based on the quality of work rather than the quantity (Governments can help too)
- Incentivizing students, staff and researchers to promote the **awareness of predatory practices** in academia while also supporting their **continuous professional development** in research ethics and integrity

Industry

- Industries could address the monetization of research by:
- Incentivizing publishing standards in the market which uphold quality research and expose predatory practices
- **Supporting the research enterprise** and its contribution to informing policy through investment in efforts which strengthen research capacity and development, which is **rigorous**, **ethical and relevant**.
